Sex and Relationships Education Policy

At Stocksbridge Nursery Infant school, Sex and Relationships Education (SRE) is taught through a thematic, topic based approach. For example, the birth of pets may be linked by younger children to the birth of a baby within their family. Each question arising is dealt with sensitivity and care.

It is a legal requirement that if SRE is part of a school curriculum within a multicultural society, it should encourage pupils to have due regard for moral considerations and the value of family life (section 46 Education (No 2) Act 1986). It is a legal requirement that the science curriculum is taught throughout Key Stages 1 and 2. Identification of male and female species is covered in Year 2.

<u>Aims</u>

The Governors and staff and parents SRE working group at Stocksbridge Nursery Infant School, believe that SRE should :-

- i) Be cross curricula.
- ii) Be set in the context of family life, in a non-stereotyped way; referring to loving, stable relationships between adults and children.
- iii) Be a continuous process which acknowledges developmental needs and takes into consideration the age and maturity of the children.
- iv) Be seen as part of the broader provisions of Health and Social education.
- v) Focus upon healthy development, rights and responsibilities.
- vi) Be dealt with in a positive but sensitive way and not cause personal offense or hurt.
- vii) Be sensitive to parents/ carers wishes.
- viii) Dispel ignorance and counter misinformation.

Objectives

By the end of Key Stage 1 (nursery through to year 2) pupils should:-

- i) Be aware of the differences between the sexes.
- ii) Be aware how pets/ animals/ babies are born (from eggs or looking like their mum)
- iii) Have a positive understanding of personal space and relationships.

Guidelines for Teachers

Teachers should be aware that :-

- i) If a topic or theme that is particularly concerned with SRE is chosen, then parents/ carers should first be forewarned by year group curriculum letter.
- ii) Parents / carers should have the opportunity to discuss forth coming issues with staff and raise any concerns.
- iii) The School Nurse/ Health Authority can provide guidelines and assistance in teaching this subject.
- iv) The Governing Body has full confidence in the staff of the school and believes that the best interests of the pupils and their parents / carers will be

served by the sensitive consideration of all matters in relation to human sexuality.

- v) The school follows Local Authority Safe Guarding guidelines and policies, relating to suspected childe abuse and / or harm.
- vi) This policy is specifically linked to Health, Behaviour, Science, Equal Opportunities, Personal Social and Emotional Development, Citizenship policies.
- vii) Reference may be made to SRE through other subjects in the National Curriculum Key Stage 1 (1995):-

- viii) Reference should also be made to other 'health' initiatives (stranger danger, healthy schools week, children's voice etc).
- ix) Where children are visibly uncomfortable and upset with a topic, alternative arrangements will be sensitively made and followed up with parents/ carers.
- x) Where children ask for further information beyond the guidelines, staff will liaise with parents / carers to agree and appropriate response.
- xi) This policy will be reviewed and updated in line with the school development plan.
