Studybugs for reporting absence

You are welcome to telephone school to report your child's absence. Alternatively you can use an app called Studybugs. You can get the app or register online here. It is really quick and easy to use. It helps us know sooner if your child is unaccounted for. Studybugs helps the NHS and Public Health organisations by collecting information on illnesses. We get a weekly update in school and it helps us to see whether there are any patterns or prevalent illnesses in the area which we can then alert parents too.


Covid & Remote Learning

We have had 4 positive cases in children since we started back last week. None of the children are related. The children are in different classes and there is no link or transmission within school. Thank you to parents who have kept children at home whilst waiting for a PCR result. Whilst this isn't in the 'guidance', I'd like to encourage it to reduce the risk of transmission in school. I don't want our children to have Covid, I really don't want our staff to have Covid. We have some regular supply teachers and support who we can call, adults who the children are familiar with. I don't really like to call on supply agencies, mainly because our young children don't know the staff and that's hard for them, all the time, but especially at the moment as they are settling into new classes with new adults and new routines. Our regular supply list isn't vast.

We are collecting information about our cases so that should we have 5 'linked' cases within 10 days, or 10% of children who are within close contact of each other (3 in one class for examples), we can notify Sheffield Public Health who will support us in what we need to do. When you ring to let us know about your child Covid wise, we have to ask you a series of questions; vaccination status, symptomatic or asymptomatic, date of onset of symptoms if symptomatic, date of LFT swap if applicable, date of PCR swab, last date in school. We will also ask whether your child is well enough to engage with remote learning, whether you need to borrow any IT hardware to allow your child access and whether you will log your child on three times each day to access live teaching. If your child is eligible for Free School Meals we will arrange a hamper for you.

Drinks and Snacks

Just a reminder to send the children with water in their bottles, not juice or fizzy drinks. Thanks. We also have a healthy school snack policy. If you are sending grapes please remember to cut them in half, length ways.
