

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

MYLOL

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? MyLOL is a tree social networking and dating site almed at teens. Profiles can publicly display users' images and information, including sexual orientation and personal interests. The service bills litter as "the number one teen dating website in the world", claiming to have more than a million users glabally. Despite its popularity, the MyLOL app is no longer available from Google Flay or the App Store, although the site is still active, in some countries, police forces and

FLIMSY AGE GATES

Although MyLOL states it is exclusively almost at users aged between 15 and 15, there is no another than 15 and 15, there is no another age verification system to prevent a younger child – or an older adult – from signing up to the platform. Coupled with the fact that it's impossible to establish a user's true identity on MyLOL, this raises a serious concern that the site could be used for grooming.

AGE-INAPPROPRIATE

left IX maintains that it manifers of uploaded images for nucley or second content, it also claims to be able to detect suspicious keywords. However, there have been numerous reports of suspicit content being found on the postform, with users often posting provocative, semi-nucle pictures of themselves and engaging in fiftry or sessiolly scalids conversation.

POTENTIAL CYBER-BULLYING

MyChi lets users "vote" on other people based solely on their appearance, much in the same vain as the now-defunct site list or his. This feature could easily lead to distress and bullying, aspecially if a distress and bullying, aspecially if a young person's profile pics receive as unfavourable response. Various reviews of MytCh have noted that bullying frequently becomes an issue in the piatform's chot groups

IN-APP SPENDING

MytOL is free to join and use, but it also offers paid for memberships. Users who have paid movey get their profile promoted at the top of the site and in search results. They can also som additional credits for increased angagement with the plotform — such as sharing, replying to messages and voting. At the time of writing, the monthly membership few years 4.55 for turning 15.57.

DATA COLLECTION

According to its privacy policy. Why to collects user data including small addresses, contract extalls and interests. While the company says it is committed to protecting users' privacy, the small print states that information may be shared externally. Mys.Ot. claims to follow procedures to keep data secure, but does not specify what these procedures are, or whether such information is energylated.

CONTACT FROM STRANGERS

MyLOL makes it easy to connect with strengers, in fact, the situry excurrence users to send private messages to people they don't know. There have been traveral media stories of adults posing as toers on MyLOL to connect with minors, which could lead to extremely dangerous situations, such as a young person meeting up with someone who has been posting under a loss sterning.

Advice for Parents & Carers

DISCUSS ONLINE DATING

It's vilait to talk to your child about the possible dangers of plotforms like My. Oi. – particularly the threat of online predators. Remind them of the risks of sharing latimate images and information with strangers and emphasise that most people don't realise they're being 'cathished' until it's too late – it really len't wise for a young person to meet up with someone they've only spaken to online.

RESTRICT IN-APP SPENDING

If your child has access to a bank card or other payment method, they may be entited into signing up for MytOt's premium features. Having their profile boosted and receiving more attention could be especially tempting if their friends also use the site. You could consider altering their device's settings to disable internet purchases, or at the very least keeping as even at their other settings.

EXPLAIN PRIVACY RISKS

NEW MESS A

Sefers your child begins using a service such as MyLDI, it's important that they understand the potential pitfalls of giving out their personal data on this type of platform. Explain to them, for example, that they shouldn't disulge any personally identifying information to people who the don't know, as soameers can be quite convincing when attempting to stead someone's identity.

SET UP LOCATION ALERTS

f you're worried that your child may be planning to meet up with comeone they've met on MyLOL, you could consider utilizing GPS or WIFI ocation tracking technology to follow their whereabouts in real time. You can even set up a virtual boundary or "lence" and opt to receive an eleft to your phone if your child enters or exits a specified area.
