We are pleased to launch the first ever Barnsley Zine Fair, which will feature 20+ local and national zine makers, writers and illustrators.

Since the 1930s, the international DIY zine scene has been a place for like-minded people who identify with specific sub-cultures, musical tribes, political parties, sporting teams or marginalised groups to share their ideas and experiences, through writing, poetry and art. Zines were essentially a form of blogging, predating social media and the internet.

Zines are predominantly self-published, hand-made magazines. The topics and themes covered in our first fair, include cooking, mindfulness, music, photography, queer politics, pop culture, rural life, travel, and plenty of ‘per zines’, aka personal biographical zines.

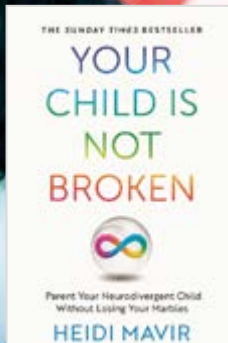

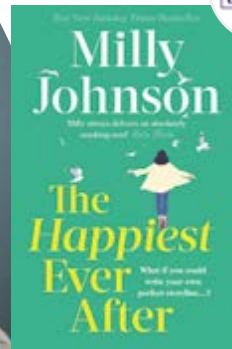

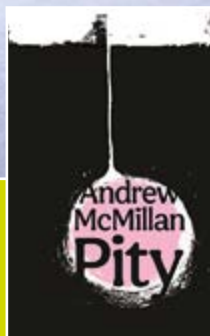

The town was once a hub of industry. A place where men toiled underground in darkness, picking and shovelling in the dust and the sleek. It was dangerous and back-breaking work but it meant something. Once, the town provided, it was important, it had purpose. But what is it now?

Set across three generations of South Yorkshire mining family, Andrew McMillan's short and magnificent debut novel is a lament for a lost way of a life as well as a celebration of resilience and the possibility for change.

Andrew McMillan was born in Barnsley in 1988. His debut collection of poetry, *physical*, was 'the sort of once-in-a-generation debut that causes everyone to sit up and take notice' according to Sarah Crown. *physical* was the only poetry book to ever win the Guardian First Book Award and in 2019 was voted as one of the Top 25 Poetry Books of the Past 25 Years by the Booksellers Association. His second collection, *playtime*, won the inaugural Polari Prize. A third collection, *pandemonium*, was published in 2021 and in 2022 he co-edited the acclaimed anthology *100 Queer Poems*, which was shortlisted in the British Book Awards. He is professor of contemporary writing at Manchester Metropolitan University and a fellow of the Royal Society of Literature.

Helen Mort is an award winning author based in Sheffield. Helen has written poetry collections, a novel and short story collection. She appears regularly on BBC Radio and has taught creative writing for over 10 years as Senior Lecturer at Manchester Metropolitan University.

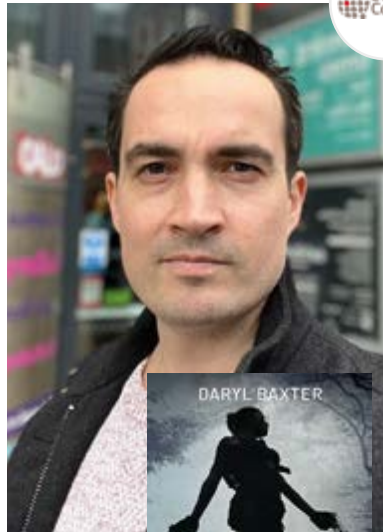

Volunteers : The Incredible Story of Kitchener's Army Through Soldiers' and Civilians' Own Words – with Richard Van Emden

What greater pride might a young man feel than to serve shoulder to shoulder with his friends in time of war? To enlist into the army with his pals, chums, mates, filling the ranks of battalions that drew their strength from the local community, from amongst factory workers, miners, shop-workers and tradesmen. In August 1914, what more fitting role was there to play than to answer the country's call to arms?

After the success of his previous books, *The Somme*, *The Road to Passchendaele*, and *1918*, best-selling Great War historian Richard van Emden returns to the beginning of the War with this, his latest volume, including an unparalleled collection of soldiers' own photographs taken on their privately-held cameras. Drawing

on long-forgotten memoirs, diaries and letters written by the men who enlisted, Richard tells the riveting story of Kitchener's volunteers, before they went to fight.

Richard Van Emden graduated from Newcastle University in 1988, and obtained an MA from Reading University in the following year. After working as a journalist he became a freelance writer and researcher. Having worked on several historically based television series, he wrote his first book, *Tickled to Death to Go* which he has followed up with several highly acclaimed and commercially successful titles, including *Britain's Last Tommies*, *Boy Soldiers*, *The Last Fighting Tommy*, *The Quick and the Dead*, *Meeting the Enemy* and *Tommies Ark*.

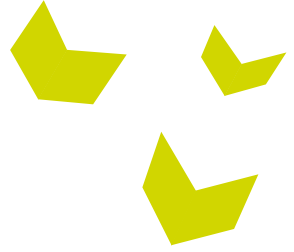
