Key Vocabulary:

Scared – when you are fearful or frightened of something. Cave – a natural underground chamber in a hillside or cliff. Lantern – a lamp with case to protect the bulb and normally has a handle so it can be hung or carried.

Why might Little Bear be scared?

Key Vocabulary:

Superhero – a fictional character with superhuman powers like Superman.

Villain – a character in a film, book or play who is evil and has evil actions.

Construction worker – a construction worker is someone who builds things in the environment.

Owies – a minor injury.

Brawls – a rough or noisy fight or argument.

Cure – make someone better.

Spurs – a spike worn on a rider's heels to urge the horse to move forward.

Key Vocabulary:

Champion – a person who has won in a sporting contest or other competition.

Tournament – a series of contests between a group of competitors hoping to win a prize.

Celebrate – acknowledge a happy day or event with an enjoyable activity.

Trophies – a cup or other decorative object awarded as a prize.

Key Questions?

- Have you got any trophies?
- Can you name any champions of a sport?
- Why is playing sport and doing exercise important to our bodies?
- Does Max still have a good night's sleep?
- Why is it important Max has a good sleep?

Key Vocabulary:

Fruits – the sweet or fleshy product of a tree or other plant that contains a seed and can be eaten as food. Pawpaw – a large fruit native to Eastern America and Southern Canada.

Guinep - small tropical fruits from the Caribbean. Guava – a tropical fruit that grows in dry or humid heat. Sweet-sop – small tree or shrub of the custard apple family. Jew-plum – also called golden apples. They are spicy and sweet tropical fruits that can be eaten ripe or unripe. Naseberry – tropical fruit native to Jamaica.

Jackfruit – a fast-growing tropical Asian tree.

Ripe – developed to the point of readiness for harvesting and eating.

Unripe – not ripe. Not ready for harvesting or eating.

Science

This half term the children will be learning about an array of different animals including humans and that they have offspring that grow into adults.

To tie into our topic of 'Healthy Me' the children will also be investigating the importance of exercise for humans and how to stay healthy through sleep, nutrition, exercise and teeth cleaning.

Design and Technology This half term is all about food technology. The children will understand where food comes from and have a basic understanding of what constitutes a healthy and balanced diet. They will prepare a healthy dish.



Place Value (within 20) The children will extend their learning to counting to 20. Children will have frequent opportunities to count verbally to 20. Children will use concrete apparatus to see the '10 and a bit' structure of teens numbers.

Addition and Subtraction (within 20) The children will explore addition by counting on from a given number to 20. Children will begin to understand that addition is commutative (can be done in any order.) They will learn about the efficiency to start with the greater number when adding numbers together.

English

AT HOME: Please read your school reading books and practise reading your tricky words regularly. Please log reading in your child's reading diary

Writing

This half term we will be using patterns and language from familiar stories in our own writing; write complete stories with a simple structure: beginning – middle – end, decide where it is set and use ideas from reading for some incidents and events.

Grammar

We will be continuing to write sentences using capital letters, full stops and finger spaces accurately.

We will be stretching our sentences by using the word 'and', alongside adding the 'ing' and 'ed' suffixes to familiar words.

Handwriting

We will continue practising letter formation and the positioning of letters using our handwriting lines. It is essential that the children form their letters correctly as this will help when they move onto joining their letters in Year 2.

Reading

Please continue to practise reading regularly at home. It doesn't matter what the reading material iscomics, leaflets, books, poetry etc. It all counts. School reading books will also be sent home alongside the assigned e-books via Monster Phonics.

We aim to promote a love of reading in school and all of our learning comes from quality books.

In this topic, the children are learning about staying motivated when things are challenging and thinking about the different ways we can maintain a positive attitude.

The children will develop their understanding of the various aspects of using a computer to create and manipulate text. They will become more familiar with using a keyboard and mouse to enter and remove text.

The children will explore and develop their sending and receiving skills through activities including throwing and catching, rolling, kicking, tracking and stopping a ball. Pupils will be given opportunities to work with a range of different sized balls.

Music

This term, the children will learn how songs and music can communicate different moods and emotions. They will investigate different ways to express the mood of a song by adding facial expressions and changing the timbre and dynamics of their voice. They will develop their understanding of musical mood through simple songs, where they will be introduced to major and minor tonality.

Children will be developing a wide range of art and design techniques through colour mixing and will produce a piece of artwork demonstrating these skills.
